## Guidelines for publication-based PhD dissertations at the Institute of Chemistry

## Based on the German version from 1.10.2022, modified on 20.12.2024 (see page 1)

## English version from 1.2.2025

For a publication-based dissertation, the following rules apply:

- 1. A publication-based dissertation can only be prepared if all supervisors of the thesis agree.
- 2. The minimum requirements for a publication-based dissertation are three publications in peer-reviewed journals (only peer-reviewed original articles; no reviews, patents, highlights, book sections, perspectives, ArXiv, Abstracts and comparable formats).
- 3. The publications must have one overarching theme and a scientific connection.
- 4. Besides the chapters presenting the publication, the dissertation must contain an introduction, a discussion, and a complete methods section along with all references relevant to the entire thesis.
- 5. The experimental and methodological details must be presented such that a third party is able to properly and safely reproduce all experiments and data analysis.
- 6. Open Access articles may only be used for the dissertation if the journal has been listed in the Directory of Open Access Journals (DOAJ, https://doaj.org/) at the time of publication of the article.
- 7. All articles have to be at least accepted.
- 8. The doctoral candidate must be the first author. Shared first authorships with one other person is possible.
- 9. The contributions of the candidate to every chapter must be clearly specified. This is either done via a front page to every results chapter or via an extended footnote clearly detailing the contributions of all authors to the chapter.
- 10. Additional publications or unpublished work may be added to the dissertation provided that at least three published/accepted manuscripts make up the core part of the thesis (see pt 2. above).
- 11. The entire dissertation has to be written in one language.
- 12. The PromO of the Faculty also holds for publication-based dissertations.
